


# INTERNATIONAL MOVING CHECKLIST

Don't get buried in the complicated details of shipping your personal effects overseas. Follow our handy checklist to make sure your belongings are shipped on time and damage free.






## WHAT YOU CAN AND CAN'T SHIP IN AN OCEAN CONTAINER:



**YES** to things you use in your everyday personal life, up to and including a car.

## SECURING A SHIPPING CONTAINER FOR INTERNATIONAL MOVING.


Your shipping company can arrange as many as you need and have them delivered to your home for loading.



Easy if you have a driveway or ample street parking.



Tougher if you need to park a container on an urban street. You may need a special permit, so allow time for this. Your shipping company can provide advice.



## PREPARING YOUR INTERNATIONAL SHIPMENT BEFORE YOUR CONTAINER ARRIVES:

Create a list of everything you will put in the containers, with estimated weights and values (for Customs).


**Produce 3 copies** of this list with one in your origin country language (for your shipping partner), another in the destination country language (for Customs) and another in the language of your choice (for you).


Label each box, tote or bag with the contents and assign a number that corresponds with your written list.



Pack and seal everything before the container arrives to minimize the time and cost for the container/driver.

Consider insurance. Talk to your shipping partner about the need to insure your shipment.





## LOADING THE CONTAINER

You are responsible for loading the container, not the truck driver.



Dollies and handcarts can help, but you'll need a makeshift ramp to roll it up to container floor height and avoid lifting.






